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# There are many forms of dementia

# Importance of Topic

To date few research studies have examined anticipatory grief and loss <u>in relation</u> to dementia care. (Pauline Boss 1996; 1999) even fewer have explored the caregiver's entire '*journey.*'

### But ... reflexive questions (my 'inner compass')

- Why should I do this?
- How should I proceed: methodology
- What perhaps would be the outcome / benefit / application of findings?
- If I do undertaken this study how may this affect participants?
- And minor issues: such as using the word 'journey' ? (cliché)





# But we ALL take 'journeys' - don't we?

- physically (geographically) and mentally (reflectively)

2009: cognitively displaced



## Background – '*my*' research journey Academic:

- Commenced 2008 (full time PhD scholarship) at Northumbria University / Alzheimer's Society North Tyneside (staff). Branch / Trustee and Chair of Cruse Bereavement Care – Newcastle / Gateshead / North and South Tyneside (trustee and bereavement volunteer).
- Follow on from a similar MSc research six older male carers in North Tyneside completed in 2003.
- 2010 part time study to manage the day-to-day activities of the Healthbridge Project. An evaluation of the National Dementia Strategy for England.
- > 2011- move to **University of Edinburgh** to take up lecturing post.

#### **Personal – routes and detours:**

- Interruptions of study illness, road accident and 5 family bereavements
- Submission April 2016.



# We ALL take 'journeys' - the planning

The traveller must first find in himself [sic] a good and sufficient reason for going .... Next he must plan his trip in time and space choose a direction and a destination. And last he must implement the journey. How to go, what to take, how long to stay. This part of the **process** is invariable and immortal. ## **Research aims**

To explore the complex experiences of family carers relating to:

- Psychological
- Interpersonal
- Socio-cultural experiences

### To identify ways of:



- meeting the physical and psychological needs integral to the overall well-being of (family) carers of people with dementia
- considering the format and development of future service interventions



## The cartography of the landscape - outline

Exploring the **experiential** and **personal detours** of carers of people with dementia, mapping the **cartography of care**, the **'***landmarks* **and** *landslides*' of their '**journey**' which is so often full of **ambiguity** 





### The challenges of:

- mourning the loss of their <u>past</u> (what they had and who they were relationships)
- perhaps not being able (understandably) to accept their <u>present</u> circumstances (ambiguity of caring/role change/life style. Dementia is so much <u>more than</u> merely memory loss – impact!)
- anticipating their <u>future</u> losses (their own and the person with dementia for whom they are caring)

# Method: to elicit 'understanding'

- Using a hermeneutic phenomenological method of investigation inspired by the philosopher Hans-Georg Gadamer which is based on the perceived and understood reality of the person. In essence their 'lived experience'
- Thematic framework of analysis using the application of and <u>building on</u> the three levels of analysis outlined in the seminal study of Fulton and Gottesman (1980) which explores three levels of anticipatory grief spanning the carer participants journeys relating to the:



## Participants: the 'companions' on the journey

- Person-centred qualitative research study undertaken within the parameters of involvement of two carer-participant group(s)
- Gatekeepers (colleagues from Alzheimer's Society Branches in the North East of England)
- To avoid *insider* research bias. Colleagues knew people (avoid non-vulnerable participants) and could offer post-interview support if required.
- 30 care-participants (CPs): (Individual spousal carers and two carer dyads of husband/daughter each within CP group 1 and CP group 2 - white ethic background = <u>limitations – white British</u>)
- CP group 1: 10 carers (who where currently caring) x <u>3</u> interviews over a period of one year (<u>1 carer end of life</u>). 8 Spousal carers (male and female, plus a father and daughter dyad and '*Lindi the dog'*)
- CP group 2: <u>reflexive</u> view of 20 carers x <u>1</u> interview (having previously cared for a family member and post the one year anniversary. Spousal carers male and female, plus a father and daughter dyad).



## Results: themes, scenes and familiar landscapes

#### **Psychological (PL):** behaviour that carers found challenging - strategies

After he 'bashed' (hit) me the first time, I knew that if I was in the bedroom and wedged myself between the wardrobe and behind the door I would be fine. You see he could never find me there. I'd just wait until he'd calmed down. After that I thought '*this can't go on'* ... but it did.

'Clare' (CP group 2)

#### Interpersonal (IPL): anger / guilt

Well, I had heard of MRSA (infection) but I didn't know what it was. But the X ward, (do you know it?) – Bloody filthy! That's where she got it I am sure and I told them [the nursing staff] that I wasn't happy! I got the local <u>MP involved</u>.

'Ernie' (CP group 2)

#### Socio-cultural Level (SCL): ritual

Spirituality. Every night I read Mary's prayers to her and then I prayed myself. Although recently I have gone back to writing **poetry** (mainly about Mary) – it helps put things into perspective for me. **My 'special moments'**

## Discussion - retracing the steps of the journey

Fluctuating perceptions and representations of 'being': sense of self



Gadamaerian -Horizons of the 'lived experience'



#### Sense of Self in relation to:

- Core self being-individual. (When will I return to being 'me'?) (Being and Becoming, Sills 2009)
  'Guilt – I wish he/she would die'
- 2. Relationship self being-to the person with dementia. Loss of partner / parent / lover / friend Ambiguity (Boss, 1999; Boss et al, 1996)
- 3. Carer self being-to the person with dementia and to others. Agnosia, disenfranchised grief, loss of 'couple-hood' (Doka, 2010; Kaplan, 2004)
