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


Discourses⁶ of the child among HPs?

HPs arguments for inclusion


- Evidence from research
- Possible future reactions
- Bereavement and preparation for death
- Honesty

HP's arguments for shielding

- Bad memories
- Exclusion from normal everyday life



Continuum of strategies



backing off

breaching confidentiality

Further analysis

- Systematic analysis
- Broader child discourses
- HP's positioning

- Practices of shielding or inclusion might be linked to discourses of the child
- HPs have to handle ethical dilemma between meeting the child's need and the rules of confidentiality
