About Carers

 Carers provide unpaid support to family members or friends with disability, mental illness, chronic illness, terminal illness, or frail aged.

• There are an estimated 2.8 million carers in Australia, 43,000 of whom are living in the Australian Capital Territory.

• Value of informal care is 6.3 billion dollars per year.



About the National Disability Insurance Scheme

- Australia introduced NDIS large social reform in 2012.
- 460,000 people with disability in Australia who are likely to be eligible for the NDIS. Of these, 5,000 live in the ACT.
- A government-funded universal life-time support program for Australians under 65 years with permanent and significant disability.
- National roll-out commences in 2016 with expected completion in 2019.
- The ACT is the only State/Territory which is rolling out the scheme in its entirety with others opting for a gradual approach.
- An individualised model of funding.
- Based on the assumption that 80% of care will be provided by informal carers/ family.
