

Swedish Care International cooperates with selected partners who represent knowledge, products and services that clearly contribute to improving the conditions for extending good care provision around the world. Amongst them;











#### SOLUTIONS... The role of new Technology....

More and better knowledge about and access to new technology to provide the best quality care.

Skilled family members, home care workers and personnel provide better quality of life often to a lower cost than the nursing home or the society (less health care and acute care needed).

The demand for more and better knowledge is growing and the need for support to individuals, organization as well as countries is substantial.




- There is an estimated 3,2 billion Internet users worldwide in 2015 with an expected annual growth of over 5%
- 2 billion are from developing countries (<u>ITU</u>). According to European studies, around 70 % of all users refer to Internet regarding health related issues (<u>BMC</u>).
- A current diagnosis of long-term illness or disability (such as dementia), indicate a higher level of health-related use of the Internet. (ECDC)



- In Europe the most active users of the Internet to find health information are those aged 30–44 years (ECDC).
- People from the middle and upper social classes are more likely to seek health information online than those from the lower classes.
- Women are more likely to look for health information online than men (BMC).



# Three Successful Digital Equations





### Online Behaviour

- 66% of health information seekers begin their search process at search engines such as Google or Yahoo
- 27% use a specific health-related website to start the search

These contain information that supports and inspire relatives and caregivers in their daily life.

















#### **Elderly Care**

Contains information and inspiration for those caring for elderly persons, also functions like find a pharmacy and share your story.



#### Memory Box

Memory Box - Coming soon for iOS and Android

Queen Silvia Nursing Award

Founded in 2013 in honor of H.M. Queens Silvia's 70th birthday, the first **Queen Silva Nursing Award** scholarship was awarded to the nursing student who could offer the best solution to the future challenges of care focusing on the elderly.

In collaboration with a few selected partners we have developed and launched – with the purpose to help create an attractive and creative nursing education for future needs in elderly and health care in locally and globally – Queen Silvia Nursing Award. Currently implemented in Sweden and Finland with several new countries to follow.

#### Dementia Forum X

- ✓ An international initiative focusing on the global challenges of dementia.
- ✓ With the goal to raise awareness about dementia and define challenges to take action on dementia.
- ✓ Dementia Forum X was held for the first time on the 18<sup>th</sup> of May 2015, in Stockholm, Sweden.
- ✓ The initiative was and is supported by Her Majesty Queen Silvia of Sweden and was organized in collaboration with Stiftelsen Silviahemmet.
- ✓ Dementia Forum X was a day of reflection and discussions between a hundred of the worlds leading business executives, policy-makers and other stakeholders.



Global Elderly Care Performance Review

One of the most imperative challenges for all nations across the world is how to cope with the ageing population and its effects in a sustainable way:

- ✓ GECPR is an international survey to capture the relative elderly care performance of nations to stimulate and inspire strategic discussions among decision-makers.
- ✓ SCI presented the first pilot survey covering a selected sub-set of nations at Dementia Forum X May 2015.
- ✓ The GECPR foundation is based on the annual competitiveness report produced by World Economic Forum.





#### Dementia Forum X eBook - A Global Action on Dementia


#### ✓ GOALS ACHIEVED:

- ✓ The book was successfully delivered on the 19<sup>th</sup> of May to all participants.


